Subject: Transfers to Four-Year Institution, 2022-23

Overview:

This report reflect data for De Anza College students who transferred to the University of California (UC), California State University (CSU), in-state private or out-of-state institutions between 2018-19 and 2022-23.

Methodology:

The data were externally sourced and accessed on March 20, 2024 from the following websites:

Summary:

Transfer by Institution Type

- In 2022-23, De Anza students continued to transfer primarily to a CSU (1,333), followed by UC (946), out-of-state (136) and in-state private (24) institution.
- Overall, total headcounts decreased by 391 from 2,830 (2021-22) to 2,439 (2022-23). The decrease was observed across all transfer institution types.

UC Transfer

- The total number of UC transfers decreased by 148 from 1,094 (2021-22) to 946 (2022-23).
- From 2021-22 to 2022-23, the headcounts of De Anza students who applied and were admitted to the UC system decreased by 395 and 243, respectively. While this represents a decrease of about 20% and 16% from the prior year, the number of applicants and admits are similar to pre-pandemic time period.
- Even though there were fewer applicant and admitted students, the overall De Anza students' UC admittance rate of 82% was higher than compared to the prior years (78%). This finding was consistent when observed by student group: International (86%), Asian (82%), Latinx (81%), white (78%) and Black (75%).

- De Anza student' enrollment rate to the UC system in 2022-23 was 75%. International (78%) and Asian (78%) students had the highest enrollment rates, followed by Latinx (67%), white (65%) and Black (59%) students. The enrollment rates for Asian, Latinx and International students improved from the prior year by 2 to 4 percentage points, whereas Black and white student groups' rates decreased by 4 percentage points.
- Berkeley (187), San Diego (158) and Davis (154) were the top three UC destinations.

CSU Transfer

- The total number of CSU transfers decreased by 200 from 1,533 (2021-22) to 1,333 (2022-23). San Jose (902), San Francisco (113) and Cal State East Bay (85) were the top three top CSU destinations, albeit with declining transfer headcounts from the prior year.
- As before, Asian/Pacific Islander (43%) and Latinx (26%) students comprised the majority of De Anza students who transferred to a CSU campus. Black students were the only student group to have a positive increase to the CSU system, from 37 to 48.

In-State Private and Out-of-State Transfer

- More De Anza students transferred to an out-of-state institution than an in-state private institution, 85% vs. 15%. Transfer headcount to in-state private and out-of-state institutions declined in 2022-23 from the prior year by 12 and 31 students, respectively. The declining trend is consistent since 2015-16.
- The top five in-state private institutions students transferred to were Santa Clara University, University of Southern California, Ashford University, Samuel Merritt and National University.
- The top five out-of-state transfer destinations were Western Governors University (UT; online), Arizona State University (AZ), Nightingale College (UT), University of Phoenix (AZ; online) and Southern New Hampshire University (NH).

Transfer Comparison with Neighboring Community Colleges

- Among the neighboring colleges of Foothill-De Anza CCD, De Anza College had the most transfer headcount in 2022-23 at 2,439 students, followed by San Mateo College (782) and Evergreen Valley (779). Foothill was close behind at 773.
- When compared to the previous year, all neighboring colleges had decreases in transfer headcounts with Foothill (-263) having the largest decline after De Anza (-391). Mission College experienced the smallest dip in its transfer headcount with five fewer transfers.

A. Transfer by Institution Type

- As in the years prior, the majority of De Anza students who transferred to a four-year institution in 2022-23 were more likely to transfer to a CSU (1,333), followed by UC (946), out-of-state (136) and in-state private (24) institution.
- Compared to the prior year, total transfer headcount decreased by 391 from 2,830 to 2,439.

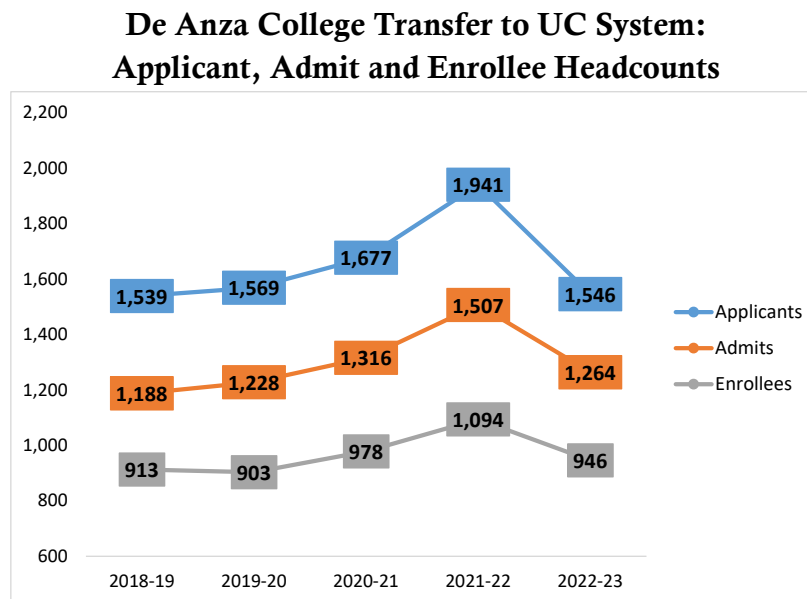

B. University of California

B1. Transfer Admittance and Enrollment Headcount Trend

- In 2022-23, De Anza students who applied and were admitted to the UC system was 1,546 and 1,264, respectively. While this represent a decrease of about 20% and 16% from the prior year, the number of applicants and admits are similar to pre-pandemic time period.
- A total of 946 students enrolled, a decrease of 148 students or 14% from 2021-22.

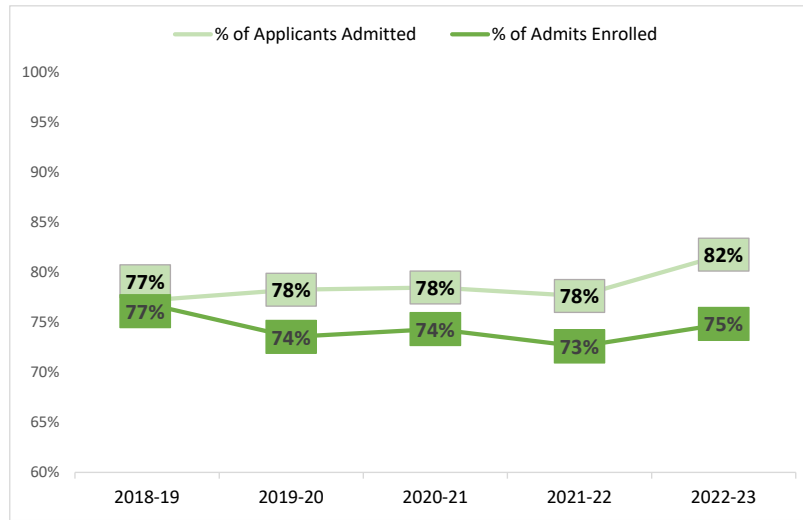


B2. Transfer Admittance and Enrollment Rate

- In 2022-23, the admittance rate was 82% and the enrollment rate of those admitted was 75%.
- Compared to pre-pandemic time period when the applicant count was similar to 2022-23, the admittance rate in 2022-23 was higher.

Admittance and Enrollment Rates**

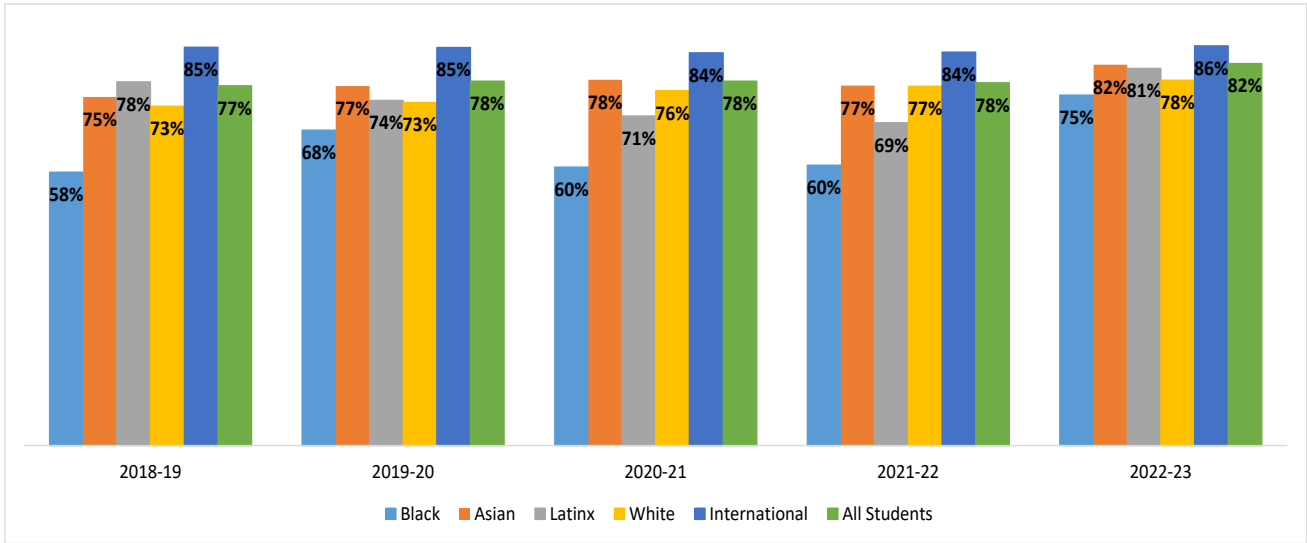


B3. Transfer Admittance and Enrollment Rate by Ethnicity

- De Anza’s Asian and International students continue to comprise the majority of applicants, admits and enrollees to the UC campus. In 2022-23, they accounted for at least 70% of all applicants, admits and enrollees. For details on the admittance and enrollment of each student group by year, see [Appendix A](#).
- The admittance rate in 2022-23 was the highest in the past five years across all student groups (refer to Figure 3). Compared to the years in which the applicant counts were similar to 2022-23, Black and Latinx students’ admittance rates were below the current 2022-23 rate of 75% and 81%, respectively. As before, International (86%) and Asian (82%) students continue to have the highest admittance rates.
- In regards to enrolling at a UC campus, International and Asian students had the highest enrollment rates in 2022-23 at 78% (refer to Figure 4). Black (59%), white (65%) and Latinx (67%) students’ enrollment rates trailed the average rate of 75%. The enrollment rates for Latinx, Asian and International students improved from 2021-22 to 2022-23 by 2 to 4 percentage points, whereas Black and white student groups’ rates decreased by 4 percentage points.

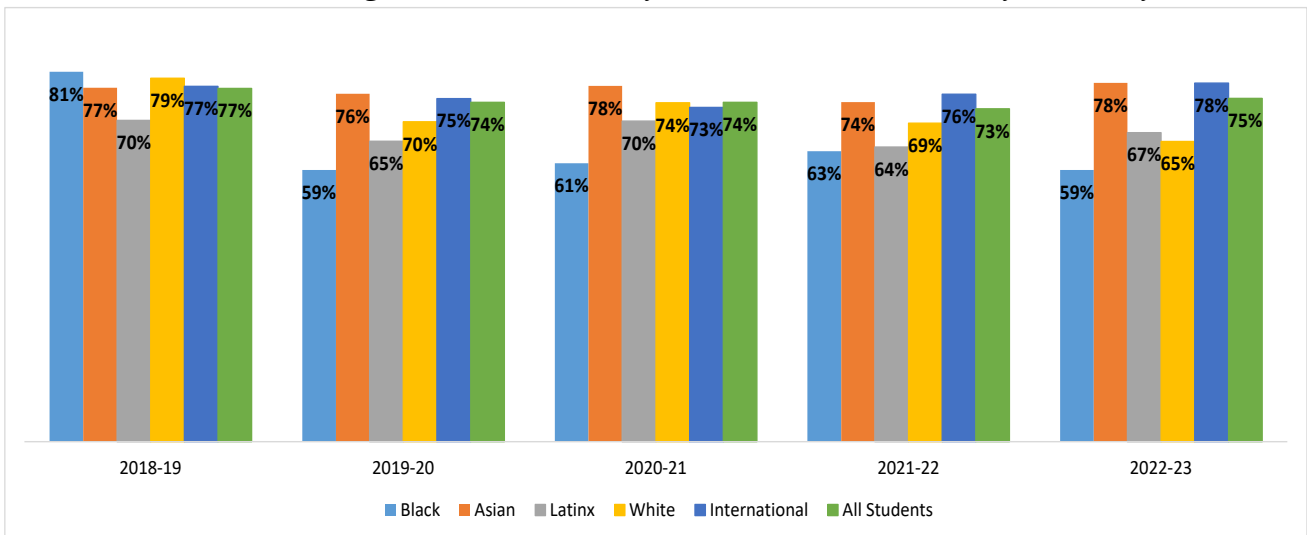
De Anza College Transfer to UC System: Admittance Rate by Ethnicity

B4. Transfer by Campus

- Berkeley (187), San Diego (158) and Davis (154) continued to be the top three UC destinations for De Anza students in 2022-23, accounting for 53% of all transfers to the UC system. Irvine (134), Los Angeles (113) and Santa Cruz (92) accounted for another 36%.

- Compared to the prior year, De Anza transfer headcounts to Berkeley and Irvine were relatively unchanged, whereas the remaining UC campuses saw declines, notably San Diego and Santa Cruz.

Applicants fewer than five and admits or enrollees fewer than three are not reported by the UCOP Infocenter and data are denoted by “-”. Summing the enrollee count by campus will not necessarily match the UC system (aggregate) total.

- Table 3 provides the average GPA of De Anza applicants, admits and enrollees to the UC system. Focusing on the top three UC campuses students transferred to (i.e. Berkeley, San Diego and Davis), the average GPA of admitted students were 3.82, 3.75 and 3.71, respectively.

C. California State University

C1. Transfer by Campus

- In 2022-23, the total number of CSU transfers decreased by 200 from the prior year, 1,533 to 1,333. As before, San Jose (902), San Francisco (113) and Cal State East Bay (85) were the top three top CSU destinations for De Anza students. When compared to the prior year, these three CSU campuses also had the largest transfer headcount decreases.

C2. Transfer by Ethnicity

- Asian/Pacific Islander (43%) and Latinx (26%) students comprised the majority of De Anza students who transferred to a CSU campus. This finding is consistent with previous years.
- While overall transfer headcounts to a CSU declined by 200 from the prior year, Black students was the only student group to have a positive increase to the CSU system in 2022-23.

D. In-State Private and Out-of-State

D1. Transfer by Institution Type

- Among De Anza students who transferred to an in-state private or out-of-state institution in 2022-23, the majority of them opted for an out-of-state institution (85%).
- The transfer headcount to in-state private and out-of-state institutions declined in 2022-23 from the prior year by 12 and 31, respectively. The declining trend has been observed since 2015-16.

D2. Top Transfer to In-State Private and Out-of-State Institutions

The top five in-state private and out-of-state institutions De Anza students transferred to in 2022-23 are provided in Table 7.

- In-State Private: Santa Clara and Samuel Merritt Universities are both located in the Bay Area., whereas University of Southern California and Ashford are located in southern California. National University has multiple campuses throughout the state.
- Out-of-State: Western Governors University and University of Phoenix are marketed as online institutions. Nightingale College is a private nursing institution.

E. Transfer Comparison with Neighboring Community Colleges

This section compares the transfer headcount of community colleges in the Foothill-De Anza, San Jose-Evergreen, San Mateo County and West Valley-Mission Community College Districts.

- De Anza College had the most transfer headcount in 2022-23, totalling 2,439 students. This finding is consistent by institution type as well, except for in-state private. San Mateo College had the second highest total transfers at 782.
