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WELCOME TO EWRT 1A AND LART 250!

These two courses work together to provide more practice and support, so that you can become a highly skilled college reader and writer. The two courses are graded separately, but the assignments are completely integrated. Find out how below . . .

Course Themes: Freedom and Happiness; Pathways and Roadblocks

How are we imprisoned, and how do we block our own happiness? We all want the freedom to find out who we really are, to explore the world, to have a life that is meaningful, one where we have the opportunity to experience true happiness. Yet we may find ourselves trapped, imprisoned psychologically or socially, and unable to discover a path to happiness and fulfillment. In this course, we will use writing and reading to explore how people express this drive to free their bodies, minds and communities and create more fulfilling lives.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- EWRT 1A: Practice writing as a multi-step process including planning and revising with attention to varying purposes, audiences, and rhetorical strategies.

Read and analyze rhetorically and culturally diverse narrative and expository texts from a variety of perspectives.

- LART 250: Demonstrate the reading and writing process and metacognitive awareness in a combined reading and writing portfolio of their strongest work.

Course Goals: Students who engage the course with diligence and curiosity will gain confidence and competence in

- Writing effective, multi-source academic essays
- Reading critically to understand and use organizational patterns
- Distinguishing between surface, “literal” reading and interpretation
- Discovering connections, patterns and analogies in order to compare and evaluate alternative points of view, values and meanings, including those from research sources.
- Writing as a complex, cyclical process of discovery, planning, drafting and revising

Writing Requirements: Students will write about 87000-8000 words, including

- Four essays 3-6 pages long based on the course readings.
- Two in-class essay
- Process work (outlines, drafts and workshops)
- Reading Annotations and Journals

Reading and Homework: Since this course is two rolled into one (8 units) the homework load is about 10-15 hours per week. I have designed these assignments to help you write better essays and become a stronger reader. In order to participate in class and benefit from each meeting, you must read and do the assignments listed in the schedule **before class**. Homework that is late for any reason will lose one point per day (20%). I do not give credit for homework that is more than a week late.

Participation: Presenting ideas to a group is a crucial academic and job skill and I want to promote your growth in this area. Quieter students should challenge themselves to break out of their safety zone and become more engaged; likewise, those who always talk in discussion need to be aware of making room for others. I will work to foster De Anza's mutual respect policy in the Zoom meetings.

Attendance is required. Attend every Zoom meeting, arrive on time, have your book handy, be prepared to write and participate, take notes and stay for the whole meeting. I do not grade on attendance, but you can't participate if you are not in class, so your participation grade will suffer if you are absent even a couple of times. In addition:

- If you miss 4 class meetings before week four, you will be dropped from the course.
- If you miss 6 class meetings by week eight, you will be dropped from the course.
- Arriving more than 5 minutes late or leaving early will count as half of an absence.

Communicate if you're having trouble! Send me email and come to the office if you are having any problems with getting to class, reading, getting started on your essays or finishing assignments. Maybe we can figure something out together.

*Note: I will “round” your total course grade to whole numbers, so that 89.5 will round up to 90 (an A-) and 89.4 will round down to 89 (a B+).

Extra Credit: You will have the opportunity to revise up to two essays for grade improvement in EWRT 1A and to take an extra workshop at the WRC for extra credit in LART 250. You can also earn 10 points for either course by attending a De Anza career, transfer or literary event and submitting a one paragraph summary of it.

Late work: Any paper turned in after the due date will be considered late and it will lose two percent per day. Late essays and homework can be turned in for **ONLY one week after the deadline, and at that point, your penalty would be 14%**. In class essays **MUST** be written on the scheduled date. However, if there are circumstances beyond your control we might be able to work out an extension of essay writing deadlines if you discuss the issues with me before the due date and if the situation warrants an exception.

Academic Integrity: I will submit your essays to Turnitin.com. Plagiarism and cheating include copying someone else’s test or homework, cutting and pasting from an online source without quoting, using others’ ideas without citing the source, getting someone else to write it up using your outline, and any other small or large act of academic forgery. Using generative AI to write the paper for you is also cheating since you didn’t write it. The penalty is, at **minimum, a “0” on that assignment**, and it could result in an “F” in the course. In addition, **all** cases of cheating and plagiarism will be reported to De Anza College administrators who may expel habitual cheaters.

- **Missing or plagiarized work receives a “0” grade, twice as low as an “F.”** Therefore, missing or plagiarized essays have the effect of two failing grades.

Student Resources: Feel free to visit my office or email me. I enjoy helping students, so don’t be shy. If your schedule conflicts with my office hours, I can make an individual appointment. Free tutoring is also available to you in the WRC (Writing and Reading Center, ATC 309). As part of the EWRT 250 course, you will also be required to meet three times with either a tutor, counselor or me.
